

QUALITY IMPROVEMENT AND HEALTH EQUITY COMMITTEE (QIHEC) Q4 2024 MEETING

TOPIC DISCUSSION Les Ybarra welcomed all attendees to the Q4 meeting and acknowledged Dr. Elizabeth **Opening Remarks** Stewart for stepping in as co-chair due to Mayra Serrano's absence. He highlighted the committee's continuing mission to address quality improvement and health equity, emphasizing collaboration with community partners to promote these goals. **QIHETP Update** Quality Improvement and Health Equity Transformation Plan (QIHETP) Progress: Dr. Elizabeth Discussed results of 2024 social risk and needs assessment in 6 most Stewart populous counties. Housing was identified as the most common social risk while substance use disorder as the most commonly reported social need. Goals were developed focused on these two identified needs. • Efforts focused on closing care gaps, enhancing preventive access, and addressing disparities across race, ethnicity, and geography. • Specific achievements include improvements in postpartum care rates among Black/African American women, utilizing doula benefit programs, and increased housing support for homeless members. Challenges such as transportation barriers, financial constraints, lack of • childcare, and mistrust in healthcare systems were discussed, with pilot programs introducing community health workers for maternal and child health outreach. Explained the distinction between non-specialty mental health services • Non-Specialty (less acute) managed by care plans, and specialty services. Emphasized Mental Health the importance of ensuring access for both children and adults across Services (NSMHS) different needs, focusing on improving delivery efficiency. Dr. Elizabeth Shared NSMHS Utilization rates and highlighted disparities by Stewart & Linh race/ethnicity, age, gender, and language. Lower utilization were Casas observed among Hispanic/Latinos, Asian, males, older adults over 50 years old, and those speaking a language other than English Requested feedback on NSMHS member facing flyer • Beginning January 1, 2023, Managed Care Plans (MCPs) are no longer • **Population Health** required to submit an annual Population Needs Assessment (PNA) and Management PNA Action Plan; instead, they must participate meaningfully in Local Strategy Health Jurisdictions' (LHJ) Community Health Assessment (CHA) and Linh Casas Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) processes as directed by the updated DHCS Population Health Management Policy Guide. • Between 2024-2027 MCPs will be required to support LHJ on current CHA/CHIP processes. • Anthem is actively collaborating in CHA/CHIP processes led by county LHJs in counties with existing contracts, a total of 16 counties. Anthem is participating in meetings, sharing data, providing in-kind staffing and funding, and collaboration with other MCPs to align with DHCS clinical strategies and bold goals Shared county shared goals for each county to align with the bold goals. including closing racial/ethnic disparities in well child visits and immunization by 50%; closing maternity care disparity for Black and



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	Native American persons by 50%, Improving maternal and adolescent depression screening by 50%; Improving follow-up for mental health and substance use disorder by 50%; and ensuring health plans exceed the 50 th percentile for children's preventive care measures
Community-Based Partnerships Updates Kristopher Kuntz Tara Brickey	 Defines the 2 primary types of partnerships, including Grant Agreements and Data Driven Partnerships For grant agreements, described process for determining strategies, selecting grants, and evaluating partners Shared evaluation results of grant agreements for Housing and Homelessness partners: Supported development of 325 new units of permanent supportive housing and 164 new interim shelter beds.
	 CalAIM IPP Initiatives: CalAIM (California Advancing and Innovating Medi-Cal), launched in 2022, aims to boost Medi-Cal services. The Incentive Payment Program (IPP) evaluates performance in contracted ECM provider programs. Described how partnerships are evaluated. Discussed Community Reinvestment Programs with a focus on housing, healthcare worker education, and addressing root causes of poor health conditions. Updates on Community-Based Organization partnerships emphasized collaborations aimed at improving access and equity, particularly through social support services. Merging efforts with private wellness providers opens doors to more flexible and effective interventions to improve health outcomes.
FindHelp Update Spenser Rudd	 Spencer Rudd presented referral data for the first half of 2024: Shared insights from the FindHelp platform, citing referral data and increasing the closed-loop rates. The current emphasis remains on refining the platform's use among member-facing associates to enhance referral conversion into actionable support. Q3: 241 associates, 1,494 searches, equating to 90 shares leading to 264 referrals, 6 closed loops (2% closed loop rate). Emphasis was placed on increasing referral volume and closed loop rates, targeting a 25% closed loop rate. Q3 saw a decrease in closed loop rates Emphasis on refining member-facing associates' use of the platform for better outcomes and increasing close loop rates. Strategies include training employees on Community Resource Link. Trusted Network Development: Onboarding status of 6 out of 24 community-based organizations (CBOs).
External Stakeholder Feedback/Priority Setting	 Engaged external stakeholders in meaningful dialogue, soliciting input for improving healthcare services and addressing inequities. Topics included expanding the underpinning partnerships for community initiatives, boosting collaborative networks, and improving the effectiveness of interventions for underserved populations.



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	 The team will explore potential partnerships with wellness providers and increase community involvement to align with strategic goals. QIHETP goals to include further discussions for asthma control, community health assessments, and exploring population health strategies.
Q&A/Closing Remarks	 Summarized key discussions and invited additional questions or feedback from participants. Reminded attendees of the ongoing invitation to nominate external stakeholders for future meetings, ensuring diverse representation. Announced the next meeting scheduled for March 2025, with a promise to
	circulate drafts of the 2025 QIHETP for review in the first quarter.
